The first recorded pandemic associated with the Avian flu was in 1890. In recent years, the Netherlands followed by South Korea experienced outbreaks of the virus in 2003. This was followed by outbreaks in Japan Thailand, China, Vietnam and other Asian states in 2004. A few fatalities were reported. By 2005 and 2006, cases of infection in birds and humans were reported in Turkey, Iraq, Syria, Europe and Africa.

Geographers have many tools to help shed significant light on the rapid spatial diffusion of this deadly virus in ways that would help us understand the characteristics of its spread, and to help devise ways to contain it.

North Korea and Iran have advanced nuclear programs and more. The differences between them are many. They include the fact that Iran is an oil-rich state located in an already volatile region that is the source of much of the world's energy supplies. The global economic weight of North Korea's immediate and more distant neighbors seem to have moderated the way the country's nuclear program are being managed.

A political storm was raised in Washington over the multi-billion dollar deal that would allow a company owned by the government of Dubai to manage six American ports including New York, Baltimore and Miami. The apparently irrational reaction to the bid by the United Arab Emirates has implications for globalization in the post-911 world.

Geographers have a lot to say about these and other matters that affect our lives on daily basis. Our collective challenge is to make our voices heard, and not only through peer-reviewed works.

I look forward to seeing you in Chicago.

AGSG Bulletin - Fall 1978

- The "Committee on Asian Geography" met at the annual AAG meeting in New Orleans with Chairman Jack F. Williams presiding.
 - The annual dues was \$2.00.
 - The editor of the newsletter was Professor Laurence J. C. Ma.
 - Elections were held and Professor Allen G. Noble of the University of Akron, was elected Chairman for the coming year (1979).
 - Among the many papers presented, the following are a selection of presenters: Laurence J. C. Ma, Shannon McCune, Allen G. Noble, Kenji K. Oshiro, Clifton W. Pannell, Christopher L. Salter, Nanda Shrestha, Richard Ulack, and William A. Withington.
 - Ten geographers from the People's Republic of China under the delegation leader Huang Ping-wie of the Academia Sinica, visited the Ohio Academy of Science from September 24 to November 1, 1978. In August 1977, ten American geographers visited the PRC. In forty days the Chinese geographers covered fourteen states, twenty-eight cities, and seventeen universities stretching from Washington, D.C. to Disneyland. In October, they stopped in Racine, Wisconsin, to join in a symposium entitled, "Geographic Perspectives on the Environment—American and Chinese Views," which was the first formal bi-national scholarly meeting in any discipline with the People's Republic of China.
 - Dr. Thomas Leinback missed the meeting because he was serving as a transport advisor to the Rural Works Programs of the Ministry of Manpower and Transmigration in Indonesia.
 - Dr. Ashok K. Dutt was serving as a guest editor for *Social Science and Medicine*, putting together an issue concerning "Geographical Aspects of Human Illness in South and Southeast Asia."
 - In August, 1978, there were 1,580 members of the AAG who listed Asia as one of their areal interests, amounting to 28.7% of the total membership.
