
Jeju Island is a small volcanic island in the south Korean Straits. We hired a local guide (Joan) to tour us around the island. The first day was south to the beach.

The seafood catch included abalone, sea slugs, sea pineapples and conch.












Sunrise peak is a favorite tourist destination.

It was crowded because it was Buddha's Birthday.




Bathing the baby Buddha is one of the practices for Buddha's birthday.












Yeomiju Botanic Garden
