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## IMPORTANT DATES

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- March 1 - Sunday - Applications available to apply for financial aid for the first summer session and/or the second summer session
- March 15 - Sunday - Priority filing deadline for financial aid for the first summer session and/or the second summer session
- April 10 - Friday - Deadline for applying for admission to a program in The Graduate School for the 2009 Four-Week Summer Intersession. Applications for readmission, post-baccalaureate status, and visiting student status will be accepted after the deadline
- April 15 - Wednesday - Final deadline for submission of application and all required documents to the Office of Admissions for undergraduate admission for the 2009 first summer session
- April 29 - Wednesday - Deadline for applying to The Graduate School for readmission, post-baccalaureate status, and visiting student status for the 2009 first summer session
- May 5 - 11 - Tuesday through Monday - First summer session registration and add/drop continue for students enrolled in the 2009 Spring Semester
- May 11 - Monday - Monday - Advising Conference and Registration for new and readmitted students. Wednesday - Last day for students in the Employee Educational Program to submit EEP form to Human Resource Services for tuition waiver for the 2009 First Summer session

- May 18 - Monday - Last day to drop a course without it appearing on the student's transcript. Last day to change grading option (pass/fail to letter grade or letter grade to pass/fail; credit to audit or audit to credit)
- May 19 - Tuesday - Last day to officially withdraw from the University or reduce course load and receive a 50 percent refund
- May 20 - June 10 - Wednesday through Wednesday - Second summer session registration and add/drop for students who entered the University in the 2009 first summer session

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## **ATTENDING THE UNIVERSITY**

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Evening and Weekend Programs is dedicated to offering high quality undergraduate and graduate instruction, complete degree programs and student services at convenient times to students of all ages. Of the nearly 10,000 students participating in the Evening and Weekend Programs every semester, many are busy people of all ages who pursue their educational goals while balancing job responsibilities, family commitments and personal interests. Those wishing to take one or two courses to enhance job skills or learn something new may choose from a variety courses taught in evenings and on weekends during the summer session. Those wishing to complete unfinished degrees or begin study may select from degree programs in:

## ■ ADMISSION

All students must be officially admitted to the University before attending classes. You will be required to submit a completed application for admission along with an **application processing fee** before signing up for classes. We encourage students to submit an admission form early, either paper copy or via the internet. If you have questions about the admission process for Evening and Weekend Programs, please contact us. NOTE: Students who did not attend in the 2008 Spring semester will be required to apply for readmission.

### Deadlines for Admission

- April 15 - Undergraduate- transfer, readmission and nondegree students
- April 29 - Graduate

**Undergraduate** - Application forms for new, readmission, transfer, visiting and non-degree undergraduate students are available from Evening and Weekend Programs or on the internet at <http://www.uky.edu/Admission/>. Those in a degree program at another institution must apply as a visiting student and submit a completed visiting student form available online at - <http://www.uky.edu/Admissions/files/Visit.pdf>.

You may expect a response about official admission shortly after your application, required documents and processing fee are received. *Note: If you plan to take all your coursework exclusively in the evening or weekend be sure to check the EW box on the application form.*

**Non-Degree Students** - Many non-degree students are considered "Lifelong Learners" wanting to pursue coursework for personal interest (enhance job skills or apply coursework toward career credentialing or advancement), or students wishing to be considered for degree-seeking status at a later date. Applicants wishing to begin or continue their study **without seeking a degree or who already have a degree** should apply as non-degree students. *Those who have been denied admission as degree seeking, who are under academic or disciplinary suspension, or who are currently under suspension at other institutions may not be admitted to the University as non-degree students.* Non-degree applicants must meet the following criteria:

- You must have graduated from high school at least two years prior to your anticipated semester of enrollment.
- You must have earned less than 24 college credit hours at the University of Kentucky.

**Graduate** - Application forms for degree or certification seeking, visiting and post-baccalaureate **graduate** students are available from the Evening and Weekend Programs or on the internet at [www.research.uky.edu/gs/gsapplcation](http://www.research.uky.edu/gs/gsapplcation). Applicants must hold a baccalaureate degree from a fully accredited institution of higher learning and adhere to specific rules regarding admission. You may expect a response regarding official admission shortly after your application, required documents and processing fee are received. *Note: If you plan to take all your coursework exclusively in the evening or weekend be sure to check the EW box on the application form.*

New students applying for admission must have two official transcripts sent by each institution of higher learning previously attended. One transcript should be sent directly to the Graduate

School and the other should be sent directly to the Director of Graduate Studies (DGS) of the program(s) of interest. Applicants must submit scores on the verbal, quantitative and analytical writing portions of the aptitude section of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) unless their chosen program is listed below.

Those in a graduate degree program at another institution must apply as a visiting student and submit a completed visiting student form available online at - [www.research.uky.edu/gs/VisitingGraduateStudentForm.pdf](http://www.research.uky.edu/gs/VisitingGraduateStudentForm.pdf).

Applicants who have not qualified for admission into a degree seeking program or do not intend to complete a degree program may apply as post-baccalaureate graduate students. Applicants must submit a bachelor degree transcript. An overall undergraduate grade-point average of 2.75 is required.

### ■ REGISTRATION

Once confirmed for admission to the University of Kentucky, you must officially register for courses before attending classes. All newly admitted, re-admitted, transfer, visiting and non-degree **undergraduate** students will receive information about participating in an advising conference where they will meet with an academic advisor and enroll in classes. All newly admitted, readmitted, transfer, visiting and post-baccalaureate **graduate** students will receive written information about enrolling in classes from the Graduate School. To enroll in classes, most students may register for classes during designated periods using the myUK portal. If you have questions, need assistance, additional information about registering or if you experience problems with myUK, please contact Evening and Weekend Programs.

#### **Academic Advising**

Professional academic advisers help and support students in many valuable ways including assisting students with scheduling classes and with University procedures, as well as providing information about majors and degrees. Students are strongly encouraged to submit transcripts of high school or prior college work in order to facilitate advising about appropriate course work. All degree-seeking undergraduate students are required to meet with an adviser prior to registering to have an adviser hold lifted. Appointments are available weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

### **ID Cards**

The *WildCard* is your official University of Kentucky student identification card and also your key to services including use of the UK libraries, to pick up tickets for campus events and other services. ### **Library Facilities**

The WT Young and Medical Center libraries open at noon on Sunday and remain open 24 hours through 8 p.m. on Friday and 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday. Students enrolled in the Colleges of Nursing, Health Sciences, Pharmacy, or Medicine, may use the Medical Center Library. For admission between 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. a WildCard is required.

### **Parking**

Parking on campus is restricted to valid permit holders between 5:00 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and until 3:30 p.m. on Friday in parking areas on the University of Kentucky campus unless otherwise posted. Signs located at the entrances to campus parking areas indicate the type of permit required and the hours of control. Evening Parking Permits allow students to park weekdays in parking structures or designated parking lots, 3:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. No permit is required 7:30 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. Students may pay an hourly rate at Parking Structure #5 or use 45-minute or 3-hour meters located throughout campus instead of purchasing a permit. The cost of an Evening Parking Permit is \$56 per semester. During annual registration periods, employees and students may apply for parking permits online. ## ■ POLICY INFORMATION

### **Changing Admission**

If you wish to be admitted and designated as an Evening and Weekend student, please contact the Evening and Weekend Programs office in 13A Funkhouser Building, University of Kentucky, Lexington, KY 40506-0054, (859) 257-3159.

**Undergraduate** – You may change your admission status from a non-degree undergraduate student to degree seeking upon earning up to 24 credit hours while enrolled as a non-degree student. To obtain a waiver of this policy and continue enrollment beyond the 24 credit hour limit, you are required to obtain special permission from the dean of your assigned college. To assist you with University procedures as well as provide information about majors and degrees, we encourage you to contact an academic adviser before you change your status.

**Graduate** – You may change your admission status from a post-baccalaureate graduate student to degree or certification seeking. Up to nine credit hours in the post-baccalaureate status may be transferred to a degree or certification program. To assist you with University procedures as well as provide information about majors and degrees, we encourage you to contact the Director of Graduate Studies in your college of interest.

### **Course Prerequisites**

Students must meet course prerequisites. To obtain a waiver of this restriction, students must obtain the consent of the instructor.

### **Registering in a Day Class**

Evening and Weekend students must obtain prior approval to register in classes taught weekdays before 5:30 p.m. (sections 001, 002, etc.) from Evening and Weekend Programs. You will be unable to register for day classes using myUK because of this restriction. If you need assistance, please contact the Evening and Weekend Programs office.

### **Changing Registration**

**Students cannot officially register for a course simply by attending a class.** Furthermore, students cannot officially drop a course by ceasing to attend. If you neglect to officially drop a course or withdraw from the University, your registration and tuition liability remain in force and a failure grade will be recorded. (Add/drop dates are listed on page 2.) You may add a course using myUK during designated periods. You may drop a course by using myUK or contacting the Evening and Weekend Programs for assistance. If you wish to drop all your courses or withdraw from the University, you must contact Evening and Weekend Programs office for information.

### **Cancelled Classes**

If the University cancels a class due to insufficient enrollments, students may choose to transfer to another class or receive a refund. If the University cancels classes due to an emergency or severe weather, announcements will normally be made by 6 a.m. through the local media, UK-INFOLINE at (859) 257-5684, WUKY radio and on the Internet at [www.uky.edu](http://www.uky.edu).

## Academic Standing

Students are responsible for becoming familiar with regulations and maintaining the proper grade point average. Evening and Weekend Programs students (including nondegree students) are subject to the University regulations concerning academic standing, grade-point average, academic probation, and dropping for low scholarship. Former students who have been academically suspended or are financially delinquent will not be eligible to complete registration until these restrictions have been cleared.

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# TUITION AND FEES

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## ■ TUITION

**Whether or not you receive a bill, it is necessary to pay tuition by appropriate deadlines.**

Always include your name and assigned student number or UK ID number on the payment to ensure proper crediting. Beginning February 1, 2008, traditional paper billing statements for tuition and fees will no longer be generated and mailed by the University. From this point forward, all account statements will be sent via e-mail on a monthly basis. Please be sure to check your University-assigned e-mail regularly.

You may pay tuition using one of the following options:

- **Mail** to Student Billing Services, P O Box 931147, Cleveland, OH 44193. Payments must be postmarked before the published deadlines.
- **In person** to 18 Funkhouser Building, weekdays, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p. m.
- **Drop Box** located outside room 18 in Funkhouser Building.
- **Credit Card** using **myUK** with MasterCard, VISA, Discover or American Express cards. You must have an active directory account to access myUK.

You can also view general information on tuition, fees, room, plus account charges, payments on account, financial aid payments, and residual/refund checks from myUK.

*Payments not received by the listed deadlines will be assessed a late payment fee of 1.25% per month fee on the unpaid balance. If you register during late registration a late fee of \$40 will be added to your tuition.*

- **May 22** - Deadline for paying tuition for students registered after May 1.

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### Selecting Courses

Students planning to apply college credit earned in evening and weekend classes toward a university degree should become familiar with the regulations and course requirements of the college of interest. Students starting their college career should select courses from the lower level requirement.

Courses numbered 100-199 are open to freshmen.

Courses numbered 200-299 require sophomore standing.

Courses numbered 300-599 require junior standing.

Courses numbered 600-799 are for Graduate students only.

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## **Degree Programs**

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### **Undergraduate and Graduate Programs available through Evening and Weekend Programs**

#### **■ Bachelor of Arts in English**

The department of English offers a range of courses taught in the evenings leading to a Bachelor of Arts in English. All necessary courses will be cycled through the program by the department. The department is unable to offer the full range of courses in some fields in the evenings, therefore, most evening and weekend students will need to follow a special advisory plan for their degree programs selected with guidance and approval of the Director of Undergraduate Studies. #### **■ Bachelor of Business Administration in Management**

The Gatton College of Business and Economics offers a range of courses taught in the evenings that allow a student the opportunity to complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Business Administration. The program is divided into two divisions. Coursework in the lower division consists of 10 or 11 pre-major courses, as well as, the University Studies Program. Coursework in the upper division (junior and senior level) consists of the college core, departmental major and electives. All pre-major and college core requirements are generally offered each Fall and Spring semester, and the departmental major requirements are taught on a rotating basis. Enrollment in any 300+ level course taught through the college requires the student to have completed the pre-major requirements and satisfied the minimum admission requirements for the upper division program. Students who have not met upper division admission requirements should consult with the Business and Economics Undergraduate Resource Center

### ■ **Master of Business Administration**

The Evening Master of Business Administration at the University of Kentucky provides students with the educational foundation necessary for development as professional business administrators. The program consists of 36 credit hours of course work taught in the evening regardless of your undergraduate background. The program consists of twelve core courses. These courses provide students with an integrated understanding of administration, decision analysis, financial management and business policy.

*Note: Students must be officially admitted to the MBA program before registering for any of the following courses.*

### ■ **Master of Health Administration**

Evening classes are an essential part of the schedule for the Master of Health Administration Program. A significant number of our students work full-time; however, they can also work toward a graduate management degree by enrolling in the evening. The program is designed to meet the needs of working health professionals who can only take courses on a part-time basis. In addition to providing a comprehensive, professional program of study for degree-seeking students, it is possible for other qualified individuals in a post baccalaureate status to enter some classes on a space available basis to learn the latest management techniques in the health administration field. The Master of Health Administration consists of 44 semester hours, which includes a management core of 15 hours, a health services core of 23 hours, a 400 hour internship, and a final capstone class. Students should have completed undergraduate courses in financial accounting and microeconomics. There is an internship requirement for the MHA program but students with health services experience are allowed to petition for an exemption. ### ■ **Master of Public Administration**

A significant number of our students must work full-time; however, they can also work toward a graduate management degree that will prepare you for a career in government or non-profit management. Many classes are offered at or after 5:30PM but a few are during the day. The Master of Public Administration consists of 42 credit hours including an administrative core of 33 credit hours and 6 credit hours in one of the five areas of concentration: Environmental Management, Health Policy, Public Financial Management, Non-Profit Management, Gerontology, Policy Analysis, or an individually tailored area. Students without previous professional work experience are required to complete an internship with an appropriate agency. Those students who have professional experience may substitute additional course work for the internship. A final Capstone class produces a project that serves as the final

### ■ Master of Public Policy

The Master of Public Policy (MPP) is a 40 hour degree that prepares individuals for careers as professional policy analysts in government and non-profit organizations. With a stronger content in statistics, economics and policy analysis than the MPA, it is also a good preparation for students planning to earn a Ph.D. in Public Policy. Many courses are offered at 5:30 p.m. or later, but a few are during the day. The program consists of a 34 credit core curriculum, one specialization course and a 3 credit internship. Specializations include Health, Transportation, Education, Environmental, Financial, Social Welfare or Gerontology Policy. The final capstone course produces a project which serves as the final master's exam. ### ■ Master of Public Health

The Master of Public Health (M.P.H) is an applied professional/graduate degree designed for highly motivated students who either have a health professional degree or a substantial interest in public health. Unique sequencing of courses, community-based program activities, and field/laboratory research provide students with multiple opportunities to define their course of study. The M.P.H. degree requires a minimum of 42 credit hours of study for completion. All students must complete 18 semester hours of required core course work and 15 hours of specialty work in one of the five concentration areas. In addition, three semester hours of field practicum experience are required. Separate M.P.H. tracks are available in each of the five areas of concentration: epidemiology, environmental health, biostatistics, health behavior, and health services management. To accommodate working professionals, most courses meet one day a week from 3:00-5:30, or 6:00-8:30 and rotate between these time periods on a semester or annual basis. ### ■ Doctor of Public Health

The Doctor of Public Health (Dr.P.H.) is a terminal professional degree that will prepare graduates to assume professional leadership responsibilities in local, state, national, and international public health activities. Course work will emphasize the integration and application of new knowledge and theory, and analytical, critical thinking, and problem solving skills to address the public health concerns of the Commonwealth and nation. The Dr.P.H. is designed as a school-wide advanced degree and will require a minimum of 63 semester hours of course work beyond the master's degree. Candidates must have a Master of Public Health, a Master of Science in Public Health, or other appropriate Master's degree. Those without a M.P.H. or a M.S.P.H. will be required to complete course work equivalent to the five basic core courses in the M.P.H. curriculum. Students will complete a curriculum spanning the five core discipline tracks offered by the College of Public Health. Typically, a full-time student will require three years beyond the master's degree to complete the program. The program is designed to accommodate non-traditional, working, and part-time students.

The Dr.P.H. curriculum includes: Fifteen semester hours of required course work in the core curriculum, which consists of an advanced course in each of the five core public health areas of concentration (biostatistics, epidemiology, health behavior, and health services management, and environmental health); A second level advanced course in three of the five concentration areas including the course in your area of concentration; a research methods course; fifteen hours of professional elective course work consistent with your area of concentration; a one-hour integrative professional colloquium in six semesters of enrollment; two supervised public health field experiences; successful completion of a core principles examination and a doctoral qualifying examination which will advance the student to degree candidacy; an integrated capstone option of either a problem-based or research-based project paper demonstrating appropriate discipline understanding.

To accommodate working professionals, most courses meet one day a week from 3:00-5:30pm, or 6:00-8:30pm and rotate between these time periods on a semester or annual basis. #### ■ **Master of Social Work**

The College of Social Work offers a comprehensive graduate program leading to the Master of Social Work degree through Evening and Weekend Programs. Applicants who do not qualify for advanced standing are required to complete 60 credit hours. The program offers a choice of two concentrations: Family/Community or Mental Health. Fifty-four credits must be in social work courses for the Family/Community concentration. Fifty-seven credits must be in social work courses for the Mental Health concentration. All required courses are offered through a planned schedule of six semesters. Electives outside of social work are approved by the Director of Graduate Studies. Students may take up to seven years to complete the program. The College of Social Work is proud of its fine tradition of preparing competent professionals who provide useful service and significant leadership to the field. Students wishing to add a business orientation to their current major should consider the 24 credit hour business minor. The pre-minor requirements in Accounting and economics provide the student with a foundation in business fundamentals. The four upper division courses in the minor offer the student an exposure to each of the disciplines within business. Prior to enrolling in upper division business courses, students must complete the pre-minor requirements and submit a program application. Please note that prerequisites must be completed for the upper division business courses. 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*The following scholarships are available to students who have cumulative UK GPAs of 3.0 or better while funding is available:*

■ **Academic Excellence Scholarship, \$1,000**

Scholarships of \$500 each will be awarded over the Summer Sessions (total \$1,000). Applicants must be *part-time, undergraduate* students who are ages 25 years and older.

■ **McClinton Book Scholarship, \$400**

Scholarships of \$400 each will be awarded during the Fall semester. Applicants must be ages 25 years and older who are admitted to the University of Kentucky as *full-time or part-time, undergraduate or graduate students*.

■ **Nofflet D. Williams Scholarship, \$500**

A scholarship of \$500 will be awarded during the Fall semester. Applicants must be students enrolled in an **electronically delivered UK course** (online, TV, compressed video, videotape, satellite, or electronic mail) who are admitted to the University of Kentucky as *full-time or part-time, undergraduate or graduate students*.

■ **UK Women's Forum Book Awards, \$250**

Awards of \$250 will be given over the summer sessions to eligible UK employees to fund books and /or other materials, supplies, and fees related to their UK coursework.

■ **UK Woman's Club Scholarships, Part-time or Full-time Tuition**

Scholarship covering tuition at the residents rate will be awarded to undergraduate students who are ages 25 and over. Funds will be dispersed during 2009-2010 academic year. Applicants may be full-time or part-time undergraduate students. Consideration will be given to women.

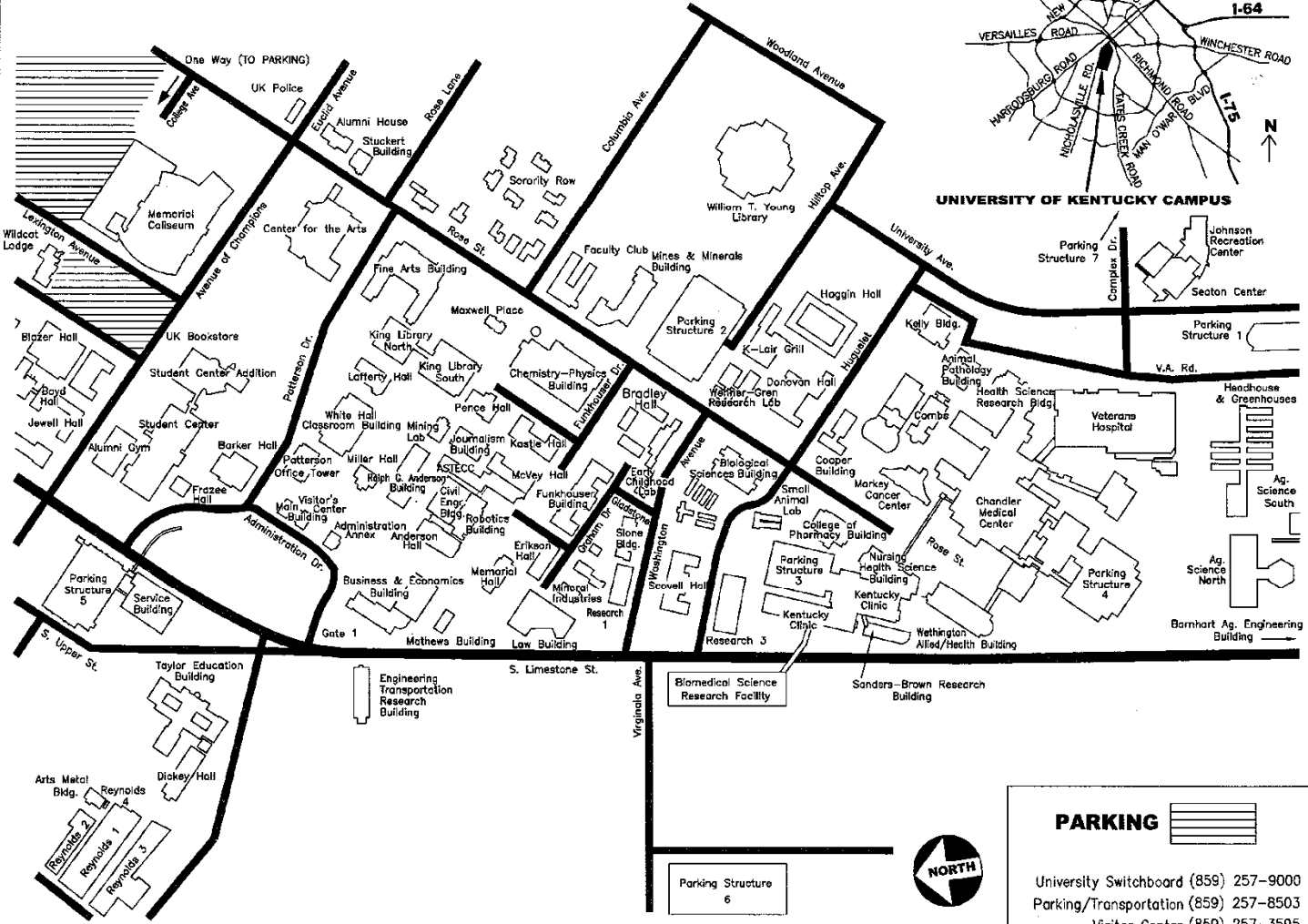
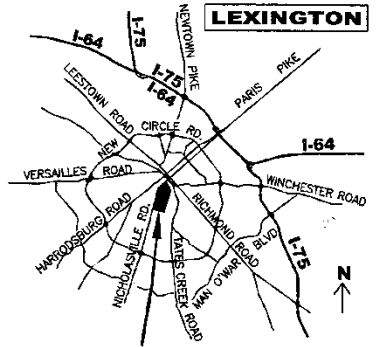
