IN THE HUMANITIES**

Established to honor an eminent Kentuckian and an outstanding alumnus of the University of Kentucky whose interest in higher education and the humanities was exceptional, this lectureship is awarded to an undergraduate whose qualities of mind and spirit have been expressed eloquently on one or more of the basic concerns of the humanities.

Any university faculty member may nominate a qualified student from any discipline, and students may self-nominate.

Each candidate will be required to submit a two-page prospectus of the lecture (the topic being of the individual's choice) and a brief, tentative bibliography. A personal resume and two faculty references will also be required.

The recipient of the lectureship will be informed sufficiently in advance to allow at least one month for the preparation of the lecture which will be given on **January 21, 2010**.

The Edward T. Breathitt Undergraduate Lecturer will receive a special award and an honorarium of \$500.
