Goals and Objectives of the Courses

The purpose of this course is to overview, from a historical perspective the development of client rights and consumer involvement in the public rehabilitation program. The culmination of this will be a focus on the recently enacted Americans With Disabilities Act. The course will concentrate on the evolution of the consumer and client rights movement. Included in this will be a discussion of how the consumer movement has helped shape and influence the rehabilitation program. The role of the consumer will be discussed in terms of the different aspects of rehabilitation; vocational rehabilitation, independent living, technology, and supported employment and transition programs. The final aspect of the course will focus on the American With Disabilities Act and the influence the different provisions of the Act will have on consumers and society.

<u>Upon Completion of this Course Students will:</u>

- 1. Understand the foundation and historical development of the consumer rights movement;
- 2. Be able to describe how the public rehabilitation program has been shaped and influenced by consumer involvement;
- 3. Understand the role of consumers in rehabilitation;
- 4. Define who are the consumers in rehabilitation;
- 5. Be able to know how to work with consumers in rehabilitation programs;
- 6. Understand the relationship that consumers have with professionals in the rehabilitation program;
- 7. Be able to identify the different needs that consumers have;
- 8. Understand the impact that consumers representing different disability groups have had on the rehabilitation program;
- 9. Understand how to do outreach and referral with consumers;
- 10. Understand the concepts of advocacy and assistance;
- 11. Be able to articulate the difference between advocacy and assistance;
- 12. Be familiar with different legislation and how consumer involvement has been enhanced through legislation and how consumers have shaped legislation;
- 13. Understand the different provisions of the Americans With Disabilities Act;
- 14. Be able to describe the concept of empowerment as it applies to consumers;
- 15. Be able to identify areas of impact that the ADA will have on society;
- 16. Be able to articulate additional areas in need of consumer awareness and involvement; and
- 17. Understand how consumers and professionals are partners in the rehabilitation process.

The Graduate Program in Rehabilitation Counseling is accredited by the Council on Rehabilitation Education. The program utilizes a competency-based Human Resource Development Training. Accreditation standards related to this course are the following:

- history and philosophy of rehabilitation and legislation affecting individuals with disabilities;

- societal issues, trends, and developments as they relate to rehabilitation.

Course Outline

This class will meet on Saturday August 26 and September 9, 2000. The following are the topics for this course which will be discussed over this period.

- 1. Introduction and overview of the course.
- 2. Basic concepts in the consumer rights movement.
- 3. Orientation to consumer issues.
- 4. Evolution of the consumer rights movement.
- 5. Description of significant pieces of legislation in the development of consumer rights.
- 6. The role of consumers in the rehabilitation process.
- 7. Consumer issues of concerns.
- 8. Discussion of the Americans With Disabilities Act and its present and future impact on society.

Course Assignments

1. Each student will develop a specific topic related to consumer and client rights issues. A paper using APA style of 5-10 pages will be prepared. The paper can be a position paper, description of a program, or a proposed model of customer services and/or involvement. Please include 2-3 references from the Web in your paper.

This assignment will count for 75% of your grade.

- 2. Participant in class activities will count for the additional 25% of your grade.
