Course Description

This course is designed to introduce participants to contemporary, ethical, and legal issues in rehabilitation in accordance with accreditation standards of the Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE). A variety of topics will be explored as they pertain to rehabilitation counseling. In general, this course will provide participants with a broad overview of best practices, societal issues, trends, and developments as they relate to the role of rehabilitation counseling in the provision of services and educational attainment of persons with disabilities and their families as outlined in CORE standards C.2.1, C.2.2, E.1, E.7.

Course Objectives

During and upon completion of this course, the participants will be able to meet the following CORE educational outcomes:

- b. To understand the Rehabilitation Counseling Code of Ethics (E.1).
- c. To identify ethical dilemmas (E.1.1).

- d. To apply ethical principles (E.1.1).
- e. To apply appropriate legal principles and utilize ethical decision-making skills in resolving ethical dilemmas (C2.1; E.1.2).
- f. To identify current issues relevant to the field of rehabilitation counseling (C.2.2; E.7.1).
- g. To identify best practices in the various aspects of rehabilitation (E.7.2).
- h. To demonstrate a basic understanding of contemporary issues affecting rehabilitation counseling and the scope of services (C.2.1).

Course Format

This course includes a lecture, discussion and participant, presentation format. Participant presentations and case studies represent a substantial portion of the class structure.

Description of Assignments

- a. Research Paper Participants are required to complete a research paper of publication quality. Participants may select a topic of interest to them or use the topic of their research course (RC 750) as a continuation. The topic must be cleared with the instructor. In order to do this a one page proposal must be submitted with the following information: (a) topic, (b) purpose, (c) statement of relevance to rehabilitation, and (d) outline of content. The paper must (a) adhere to APA guidelines, (b) be 12–15 pages including references, and (c) submitted in hard copy and disk. The grade sheet (see attachment) must be turned in with the paper.
- b. <u>Exams</u> two (2) exams will be administered in this class. A midterm and a final exam based on the text, notes, readings, handouts, and lectures/discussions. The exams will be in case study formats. The exams are non-cumulative.
- c. <u>Readings</u> –In addition to the text, readings will be made available to you. Participants are expected to have completed assigned readings prior to class.

Class Attendance & Participation

In order to receive class attendance and participation points you must attend class. These points are based on class attendance and contribution to discussion (Applicable only to on-campus students).

Late Assignments

Any assignment turned in late must be approved by the instructor. A penalty of 5% of the total points of the assignment will be assessed for each day (including weekends) the assignment is late. Examples of unacceptable reasons for late assignments include computer problems, or unavailability of resources. NO ASSIGNMENT WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER ONE WEEK OF THE DUE DATE without written documentation supporting a reasonable excuse.
