<u>Suspend Program:</u> B.S. in Food Science with major in Food Science

<u>Reason for Suspension</u>: Major review of curriculum with new course development is planned. Enrollment declines in the past five years. Concern for appropriate stewardship of NFS/HES resources in meeting demands of heavily requested programs in Dietetics and HMT.

<u>What Provisions are being made for Students Already in the Program</u>? FSNF students will have access to the academic experiences for completing the degree and graduation requirements via University policy. Individualized faculty guidance will continue.

<u>Program Name Change:</u> B.S. in Human Nutrition with major in Food Science

<u>Change to:</u> B.S. in Human Nutrition with major in Human Nutrition

<u>Background</u>: This change is requested to separate the B.S. in Human Nutrition from the B.S. in Food Science. Officially, both have the same major title. However, the Department of Nutrition and Food Science is requesting to suspend the B.S. in Food Science, while retaining the B.S. in Human Nutrition. Human Nutrition has generated greater student enrollment than Food Science.

<u>B.S. in Human Nutrition</u> - enrolled 13 in Fall 2000 when it was first offered; has risen to 32 in the Spring, 2002

B.S. in Food Science - enrolled 17 in Fall 2000; has dropped to 2 in Spring 2002

<u>Note</u>: Neither proposal change is expected to impact the B.S. in Food Science in Agriculture, except that, students in a food science major will be directed to the program in the College of Agriculture.

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
