##### New Courses:

- A-E 675     Aesthetics and Design (3)  
Focuses on advancing aesthetic awareness, developing an understanding of the principles of visual design, and the application of aesthetic design to human-computer interaction in order to integrate an artistic approach to the examination of technological innovation.
- A-E 576     Art in Middle Schools (2)  
Study of perceptual and aesthetic awareness in Middle School level children/adolescents. Field and practicum experiences with methods and materials appropriate to the teaching of art in the middle school. Lesson planning, curriculum design, evaluation, teaching skills, classroom safety, and multicultural activities. Included: readings, lecture, discussion, demonstration, micro-teaching laboratory and studio experiences. Prereq: Major in art education, or consent of the instructor.

DIP 750      Defense Statecraft (3)

Students will gain familiarity with the key military policy issues that confront government officials, and they will learn to evaluate the claims of journalists and advocacy organizations that confront informed American opinion on a day-to-day basis.
