## Change in Doctoral Degree Program - Rehabilitation Sciences

At present, students are required to complete one, 4-credit hour Research Apprenticeship. This Apprenticeship is optional for those who have participated in research in the past. The keystone of doctoral education is the research process. The faculty believes that a more comprehensive research experience must be required if students are to achieve the necessary competencies in the research process. Having at least three Research Apprenticeship experiences will provide a broad base of experience, expose students to different ideas, methods, and protocols, and will help them develop an area of interest based on experience. Multiple Apprenticeships will foster interdisciplinary relations and knowledge required of an interdisciplinary program.

This change in program might add up to five credits to a student's course of study. We do not believe this change is significant since the students must achieve a base level of research knowledge and skills to pass qualifying examinations and complete the dissertation, no matter how many Research Apprenticeship experiences they. have. Requiring 3 Research apprenticeships for a total of 9 credits clearly identifies the required competencies and course of study.

Rehabilitation Sciences Doctoral Program

The College of Health Sciences recommends for your approval the following change in an existing courses and change in program for the Rehabilitation Sciences Doctoral Program:

## RHB 770: Professional Seminar in Rehabilitation Sciences

**Proposed Changes:** Change from 1 credit to variable credit (1-3) and change in course description

<u>Present Description:</u> A study of selected topics in the Rehabilitation Sciences with emphasis on recent research and theory in the disciplines of communication disorders, occupational therapy, and physical therapy. Includes topics in health systems delivery, interdisciplinary issues, and research methodologies. May be repeated to a maximum of six credits.

New Description: A study of selected topics related to leadership issues in the Rehabilitation Sciences with emphasis on recent research and theory related to higher education and to the communication disorders, occupational therapy, and physical therapy disciplines. Sample topics include research methods and current topics, interdisciplinary issues, health systems, grant writing, teaching and learning in higher education, and the culture of colleges and universities. May be repeated to a maximum of six credits.

**Rationale:** The change to variable credit will allow greater flexibility in the course. We have found that certain topics warrant more than 1 hour of credit. The new description is proposed to allow opportunities for study related to assuming leadership roles in higher education as well as discipline-specific and interdisciplinary topics of interest.

### RHB 789: Research Apprenticeship

Proposed Change: Change from 1-4 credits to 1-7 credits.

**Rationale:** The change allows for greater flexibility and variety in student research apprenticeship experiences depending upon the students' schedules and available opportunities.

Change in Doctoral Degree Program

Proposed Change: Change in requirement for Research Apprenticeship as follows:

<u>Present Description</u> (p. 114, Grad Bulletin): A research apprenticeship is required for students without prior research experience but may be taken by all students.

RHB 789 (1-4)

New Description: A research apprenticeship s required for all students. The Research Apprenticeship course is variable credit and must be repeated at least 3 times for a minimum of 9 credit hours.

RHB 789 (1-7)

Rationale: At present, students are required to complete one, 4-credit hour Research Apprenticeship. This Apprenticeship is optional for those who have participated in research in the past. The keystone of doctoral education is the research process. The faculty believes that a more comprehensive research experience must be required if students are to achieve
