

Co. official accused of hitting reporter

Controversy has again erupted over the office of Judge-Executive Pike Wayne T. Rutherford, after an appointee in his office allegedly assaulted a News-Express staffer on Monday.

The allegations surround Charles Carlton, director of the county's office of energy and community development, who allegedly assaulted News-Express News Editor Chris Anderson during an altercation Monday

According to court documents, on Monday afternoon, Anderson was exiting the front door of the Appalachian News-Express building when he saw Carlton crossing the street toward the front door of the newspaper's offices.

"I stopped to hold the door open for Carlton when he approached me and hit me with a closed fist in the left arm above the elbow," document quoted Anderson as saying.

Virgie man dies in weekend crash

A Pike County man was killed last weekend in a crash on U.S. 119 near Pikeville.

According to Pike County Coroner Russell Roberts, Jason Dean "Mivagi" Maynor, 32, of Virgie, was killed in the wreck Saturday afternoon

Kentucky State Police Trooper Eddie Crum said the crash occurred near the Burning Fork exit on U.S. 119 when Maynor, who was traveling south, drifted off the shoulder of the highway and overcorrected his vehicle. Crum said Maynor's vehicle then entered the gravel median of the highway, overturned several times and ejected Maynor from the vehicle.

Maynor was flown to Holston Valley Medical Center in Tennessee where he died late Saturday evening.

Crum said Maynor had an ankle bracelet on his leg at the time of the wreck and was serving home incarceration. Alcohol is suspected to be a factor in the wreck, Crum said.

Maynor was born in Pike County, Oct. 12, 1979, the son of Jerry Dean Maynor and Teresa Roberts.

He was preceded in death

Former Dawahare's building to be new home of JWT

Jenny Wiley Theatre is in Prestonsburg currently, but has a new home in Pikeville

At a Jenny Wiley Building Committee meeting this week, Pikeville City Manager Donovan Blackburn announced that it's official. The new Jenny Wiley Theatre will be located on the corner of Second and Division Street, using a portion of the old Dawahare's building.

The city's decision to use the Dawahare's building location is to "save money, time and efforts" according to Blackburn.

"This decision could save us several mil-

lion," he said.

Currently, the old Dawahare's building houses a church and the Pike County Artisan Center, but with the city's acquisition of the building, the church and Artisan Center must find new homes.

Blackburn said that the city offered the church the Garfield House on South College Street on Sundays from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Plans for the Artisan Center were not

immediately known. Blackburn said the city brought Lexington based architecture firm
