# **Course Description**

This course is designed to assist undergraduates in adjusting to the academic life of the University. Through lectures, discussions, exercises, and out-of-class assignments, UK 101 helps students reach the student learning outcomes listed in this syllabus.

### **Student Learning Outcomes**

Students will:

- 1. Create academic goals and articulate the differences between high school and college academic expectations.
- 2. Apply learning strategies to maximize academic success.
- 3. Understand University policies.
- 4. Locate and use designated campus resources.
- 5. Recognize personal and social issues (e.g., alcohol, diversity, financial wellness) that first-year students often face in a college environment and be able to identify and select appropriate campus resources.

### **Course Requirements**

- Class participation is critical to the success of students, and it adds to the success of the course.
  Participation includes attending and being prepared for class, involving yourself in class discussions
  and activities, assuming responsibility for your own learning, and contributing to the learning of
  others.
- 2. Classroom decorum is important to a conducive learning environment. Being respectful of your classmates and instructors includes engaging in civil discourse when we discuss topics that have a diversity of perspectives; silencing your cell phone; not texting; and other behaviors outlined in class.
- 3. Complete and submit assignments as directed (via Canvas, email, or hard copy—whichever instructor chooses) by designated dates and times.

### **Attendance Policy**

Students are expected to attend **ALL** class sessions unless their absence is excused. Attending class is an important part of succeeding in any course, especially a discussion-based course like UK 101. Refer to the above "Grading Criteria and Assignments" section for information on deduction of points due to unexcused absences. Please see below for what constitutes as an excused absence.

PLEASE NOTE: According to University Senate Rule 5.2.4.2: "If a student has excused absences in excess of one-fifth of the class contact hours for that course (participation activities for an online courses, as defined in 5.2.4.1.A), the student shall have the right to receive a 'W', or the Instructor of Record may award an 'I' for the course if the student declines to receive a 'W'." For the purposes of this class one-fifth (20% or more) of class = **4 classes**.

# **Excused Absences and Verification (University Senate Rule 5.2.4.2)**

Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible. Senate Rules 5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences: (a) serious illness, (b) illness or death of family member, (c) University-related trips, (d) major religious holidays, and (e) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the professor.

Students anticipating an absence for a major religious holiday are responsible for notifying the instructor in writing of anticipated absences due to their observance of such holidays no later than the last day in the semester to add a class. Two weeks prior to the absence is reasonable, but should not be given any later. Students are expected to withdraw from the class if more than 20% of the classes scheduled for the semester are missed (excused) per University policy.

The professor must give the student an opportunity to make up the work and/or the exams missed due to an excused absence, and shall do so, if feasible, during the semester in which the absence occurred.

In cases where students feel unsure about a question of plagiarism involving their work, they are obliged to consult their instructors on the matter before submission.

When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording, or content from another source without appropriate acknowledgment of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism.

Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work (including, but not limited to a published article, a book, a website, computer code, or a paper from a friend) without clear attribution. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work, which a student submits as his/her own, whoever that other person may be. Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone.

When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources or information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where and how he/she has employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content, and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas, which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain.

Please note: Any assignment you turn in may be submitted to an electronic database to check for plagiarism.

# ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. Read Academic Expectations and Quiz before the second class, you will need to log-in to Canvas, read a copy of the Academic Expectations worksheet and complete the short quiz.
- 2. Course Syllabi Assignment- Go through all of your course syllabi and identify the two courses that you think you will experience the most difficulty. Write a short paragraph explaining why and submit to Canvas. You will want to have access to those 2 syllabi for class (either print out or have available on your laptop).
- **3. Group Presentation** Your group will investigate all members' syllabus and create a short group presentation where you will discuss the key points of the syllabi, and discuss ways in which to be successful in the course(s).
- 4. Calendar Assignment Read through all of your semester syllabi and place your due dates into a planner or calendar for the entire semester. Bring completed to class and show your Peer Instructor.
- **5.** How's it Going Reflection Write a one page, double spaced reflection about your first few weeks as a UK student... use these questions as prompts for your thoughts.
  - Looking back over the past several weeks, how has your experience at UK fit with your expectations of college? What have been some of the adjustments? What have you changed about your study strategies?
- 6. Education Abroad Fair Reflection The Education Abroad Fair is September 14<sup>th</sup> (3-7pm, Hub of William T. Young Library) You will be required to attend the Education Abroad Fair and write a 1-2 page, double spaced, reflection. Specific prompts to address in your reflection will be given closer to time.
- 7. Academic Integrity Quiz Complete the Academic Integrity Quiz on Canvas prior to class.
- **8.** Weekly Time Plan You will track how you are spending all of your time for an entire week (you can use general categories). You are expected to give an honest depiction of your time spent during the week you are tracking. Show completed week planner to Peer Instructor.
- 9. Campus Resource Assignment You will be responsible for utilizing a campus resource by the end of September and completing a short reflection (submitted to Canvas) regarding your experience.
- 10. Financial Wellness Homework Students should create an iGrad profile. After profile creation and using the "Keyword" search box within the platform, students should search a topic they would like to explore and find an interesting article or reference to read. Students should write a 1-page paper on their search and give the reader a summation of how they better understand the topic.
- **11. Unconscious Bias Packet Survey -** Complete the homework assignment found in the Unconscious Bias student packet.
- **12. Student Involvement Presentation –** You will be required to attend one registered student organization meeting or event this semester and give a 1-2 minute presentation about your experience. Please describe the following:
  - What event/ organization did you attend?
  - How did you find out about it?
  - How do other UK Students get involved with this organization/ event?

- What is one thing you learned about yourself or others as a result of your attendance?
- What are your future plans (if any) with this organization/ event?
