July promotion to feature Kentucky farmer-florists

Last July, the University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Horticulture Council (KHC) launched a promotional campaign to highlight farmer-florists across Kentucky, and we want to again feature growers in 2021. Each day in July we will feature one to two Kentucky farmer-florists across the KHC social media platforms (Facebook, Instagram and Twitter). Last year we touched more than 55,000 social media users and since our followers and reach have grown considerably since then, we expect to double that number easily.

If you are interested in being featured, we will need some basic business info and a few images submitted through a simple <u>Google form</u>. We take care of the rest – making the posts, sharing across other accounts, and contacting your local extension agents to help amplify exposure.

A few things are changing with the 2021 promotion, including the farm submission timeline. We want to get all businesses scheduled by **June 1**, so our farmer-florists can then coordinate any business efforts with their operation's statewide promotion day.

We will again promote the "Lonely Bouquet" program and anyone is welcome to participate in that activity. For those of you who are not familiar with the Lonely Bouquet program, it is an international program where people leave an arrangement with an explanatory tag in their local community for someone to find and adopt. It's just a way to spread the joy of flowers, especially those grown locally.





Drier than average start to May in Eastern Kentucky, warmer and wetter than average overall

A drier than average pattern is predicted to affect most of the southern half of the United States in the first half of May, which includes the eastern third of the commonwealth. Overall in May, conditions in the Midwest, the Ohio River Valley, and the Southeastern U.S. are forecast to be wetter than average, so we should see increased precipitation in the second half of May.

The forecast for temperatures is simpler: warmer than average. Warmer than average is the trend for the first part of May, the entire month of May, and the months of May, June and July. It should be noted that the National Weather Service will be using the 30-year period from 1991-2020 for averages, and no longer calculating averages with data from 1981-2010. This shift forward happens every 10 years and has been the process since the incep-

KY Farmers Market Price Report returns


