Other states are exploring UK CSA Voucher Program

The University of Kentucky's Department of Agricultural Economics hosted extension professionals from Michigan, West Virginia, and Kentucky in August for a two-day in-service about <u>UK's Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) Voucher Program</u>. UK's CSA Voucher Program is a health and wellness benefit to UK employees and retirees that provides a \$200 discount applied to a season-long vegetable CSA subscription with participating local farms.

The in-service included farm tours of the UK CSA and Elmwood Stock Farm, partner farms in the CSA Voucher Program. In addition to growers, participants heard from researchers in entomology, horticulture, nursing, and dietetacademic ics; an administrator has built curriculum

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value on the investment (ROI and VOI); and our partners at the Organic Association of Kentucky, who administer the Kentucky Farm Share Coalition. Discussions about benefits to human health, employee perception of the workplace, local investment in sustainable agriculture, and opportunities for teaching and research afforded by the program demonstrated broad direct and indirect benefits of offering a CSA Voucher Program in a university. Meals throughout the in-service featured local fare, including at the UK CSA's weekly community lunch and area restaurants that source ingredients locally.

The goal of the in-service was to generate interest in CSA programming at other institutions of higher education and beyond. Participants were interested in creating similar CSA programs in their regions or states and reported having benefited from the program. In a follow-up survey response, one participant said, "I feel equipped to create a strategy with colleagues for a similar effort at our university, as well as to support other employers considering CSA as an employee benefit."

Producers as well as technical assistance providers are encouraged to participate




Warmer and drier than average start to September in Kentucky

After this brief relief from the very warm days in the last week of August, the commonwealth is heading right back into warmer than average conditions for the first weeks of September. The NOAA's Climate Prediction Center is forecasting a near certainty for above average temperatures for most of the U.S., with a very high likelihood of above average temperatures for the entire Midwest down into Texas. Warmer than average conditions are likely to continue until late September, though a cooler weather pattern to the north may provide some small chance of relief.

This warmer weather is expected to bring below average rates of precipitation in September, increasing the need for supplemental irrigation.





The likelihood of drier than average conditions falls off moving into the second half of the month, with some longer range models indicating a slight possibility of increased precipitation in late September.
