# New Kentucky horticulture podcast is available now!

A team of extension professionals in Kentucky have started a new podcast, available on all podcast platforms. Alexis Sheffield (Boyle

County horticulture agent), Ray Tackett (Bourbon County horticulture agent), Josh Knight (Center for Crop Diversification) and Brett Wolff (Center for Crop Diversification) discuss the business, production and joy of farming. Weekly episodes are posted every Sunday.

The most recent episode talks through evaluating new enterprises using some extension resources and some common sense. Previous



episodes have talked about soil health, why you shouldn't call it dirt, considerations for those who have just bought (or are about to buy) a farm, and a general orientation to the things you should be considering as you start or continue your growing journey. The podcast blends science-based production and marketing information with humor, grounded experience, and general joy about plants, local foods, and engaging with multiple facets of the world of horticulture.

# Expect warmer and wetter than average start to April

The first weeks of April are likely to be warmer than average, according to the <u>NOAA's Climate Prediction Center</u>. An above average probability for above normal temperatures is likely for the eastern half of the U.S. and the southeastern region in general. In the second half of April, the current picture does not indicate above or below average temperatures just yet, leaving a somewhat uncertain prediction. Overall, for the month of April, the CPC is forecasting warmer than average temperatures.


A similarly consistent pattern is expected for precipitation as well, with the first weeks of April showing a likelihood of above average precipitation for much of the country, but particularly in the Mississippi and Ohio River areas. This wetter

than average entry into the growing season can present timing constraints with early season tillage and planting as saturated fields are easily compacted, rain splash can spread plant diseases, and not to mention general issues with flooding. It is currently uncertain if the latter half of April will be drier than average, be wetter than average, or show a return to normal precipitation rates.

### Still time to respond to the 2022 Census of Agriculture

From the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service Kentucky Field Office

Kentucky farmers still have time to be counted in the 2022 Census of Agriculture, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS). Although the deadline for submitting the ag census has passed, NASS will continue to accept completed census questionnaires through the spring to ensure all farmers take advantage of the opportunity to be represented in the widely used data.

"Many farmers have already responded, and that information will be great for the future of Kentucky agriculture," said David Knopf, director of the NASS Eastern Mountain Regional Office in Kentucky. "There's still time for every producer to let their voice be heard by responding to the Census." Census data inform decisions about

policy, farm and conservation programs, infrastructure and rural development, research, education and more.

NASS will continue to follow up with producers through the spring with mailings, phone calls, and personal visits. Farmers are encouraged to complete their ag census either online at <a href="mailto:agcounts.usda.gov">agcounts.usda.gov</a> or by mail as soon as possible.

It's important that everyone who received the 2022 Census of Agriculture questionnaire complete and return it, even if they are not currently farming.

NASS will release the results of the ag census in early 2024. To learn more about the Census of Agriculture, visit <a href="mass.usda.gov/AgCensus">nass.usda.gov/AgCensus</a>. On the website, producers and other data users can access frequently asked questions, past ag census data, special study information, and more.


