Rational for A-S 547

After completing the past several years' assessment cycles, it has become clear that UK/SAVS needs to offer more advanced digital project based courses to foster continued advancement in the education of our digital media majors. This course will allow these majors to create more expanded, developed, ambitious work outside of the assignment-based 300 level courses that we currently offer.

The proposed Digital Media and Design Projects course would become an upper level class for undergraduate majors who are embarking on an ambitious portfolio or thesis level of project. Previously such work would be done as an independent study. The UKSAVS faculty finds the work done in independent studies to be less than adequate and believe that a projects class of peers would much improve this type of work.

In this projects based course students need to submit a proposal for their project as their course of study (just as they would have to if they were to take an independent study) except that this proposal would be more in-depth (requiring a sketch, research and a gradable proposal instead of just a form granting them an independent study). Also they would be enrolled in a course with other digital media students who also are proposing their own independent research. Faculty in digital media have multiple expertise in digital tools, as do many of our students, and therefore will be able to support the research needs of these students who could be working on the following at the same time: a short film, an animation, a web database, a hybrid performance or installation, a graphic design portfolio or even 3D animation.

By assembling these advanced students together in a projects class, we are fostering peer review and peer critique. The students would be in a class with faculty supervision. The faculty member would set research and critique dates, studio visits and evaluate the progress of the proposed work throughout the semester. This advanced group of students would give each other valuable feedback and suggestions on the proposed work.

We find this type of advanced workshop style course very exciting and believe it would create a culture of excellence and a good competitive spirit among our upperclassmen and women.

Course Description:

An advanced course that allows digital media students to propose and create large-scale, in-depth projects such as short films, video installations, a complete animation, web-based research projects, etc. that require time and focus to produce. Independently driven projects will be developed in the classroom setting. 3 credit hours, may be repeated up to 9 hours. Prerequisite: Consent of Instructor.

Course goal:

This course is designed to help student's develop ambitious and advanced studio work in any digital area. Large-scale video installations, short films and animations, as well as larger web based work will be fostered and expected in this course.

Student learning outcomes:

By the end of this course, you should be better able to:

- Demonstrate clear vision and articulate a developed idea visually.
- Understand the basic principles of designing and completing advanced studio work.
- Effectively manipulate the digital tools to demonstrate high levels of craft.
- Develop creative strategies, such as convergent thinking, divergent thinking, collaboration, brainstorming, and idea mapping to solve projects.
- Analyze critically their own work and the work of others.
- Develop critical, conceptual thinking.
- Utilize library resources for research.

Lab fee: \$50

Required Text and Readings

To be determined on a case-by-case basis. Students will propose projects and will be assigned readings that directly relate to their specific project.

Class Structure and Requirements:

In class:

The majority of class time will be structured around critical understanding, theory and working on proposed projects.

Homework:

Each student is expected to spend at least 6 or more hours in addition to class time researching ideas, and working on assignments.

Attendance and Absence:

Attendance: Students must attend all classes in order to do well in this class. You will not be allowed to make up any in-class quizzes/exercises for unexcused absences. Excused absences must have appropriate verification: written doctor's excuse, obituary notice for immediate family members only, University-related trips with documentation, or major religious holidays (for which you must notify me in

writing before January 20th). With excused absences, TAs and instructor will help students stay caught up with class materials. Extended absences will be dealt with as an academic issue.

Excused Absences: S.R. 5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences:

1. Serious illness;
2. Illness or death of family member;
3. University-related trips;
4. Major religious holidays;
5. Other circumstances you find to be "reasonable cause for nonattendance".

In absences related to illness, death or travel, an instructor will require verification such as a written doctor's excuse, a death notice from a newspaper or formal notification from University personnel documenting participation in a trip. If verification is not presented within a week of the absence, the absence will be termed unexcused.

There will be no make-up quizzes, exams, or papers without appropriate verification according to S.R.5.24.2.

Graduate media students in this course will also propose and create three ambitious or large-scale, research projects, that require an MFA level of development; i.e. work that has a distinct, well-conceived concept; the craft and presentation of which are at gallery levels and reference contemporary modalities.

As a Graduate Student your grades will be determined by the following formula:

- 90%-100%= A, exceptional achievement, above and beyond course requirements
- 80%-89%= B, satisfactory achievement, in fulfillment of all course requirements
- 70%-79%= C, bare minimum, failing achievement, basic course requirements unmet
- 69% or below= E, failure to fulfill basic course requirements

Each project will be graded on a 100% scale broken down in the following percentages:

- 20%= Proposal and Research and Sketch
- 40%= Critiques
- 40%= Final Portfolio/3 Finished Projects, Artist Statement and Powerpoint

Your final grade will be determined by an average of the scores of these three projects:

1. 500 WORD PROPOSAL FOR THE PROJECT. YOU MUST DETAIL HOW YOU WILL REPRESENT YOUR FEELINGS AND IDEAS WITH RESPECT TO MATERIALS AND MEDIA.
2. RESEARCH AT LEAST FIVE ARTISTS WHO ARE DOING WORK RELATED TO YOURS AND PRESENT ONE ARTWORK OF THEIRS AS WELL AS A 100 DESCRIPTION OF WHAT THEY DO.
3. SKETCH WHAT YOU WANT YOUR PIECE TO LOOK LIKE IN A 20 CELL STORYBOARD; PRESENT THIS WITH YOUR FINISHED PIECE
5. TYPE YOUR ARTIST STATEMENT; (250 WORDS) STATEMENT DESCRIBING THE CONCEPT OF THE WORK. MOUNT IT ON FOAM CORE AND MOUNT NEAR FINISHED PIECE AT ALL CRITIQUES
6. CREATE THE PROPOSED WORK
7. SUBMIT AND PRESENT ALL THE ABOVE AS A POWERPOINT DURING THE FINAL CRITIQUE FOR YOUR GRADE
