The Foreign Language and International Economics (FLIE) program was established at the University of Kentucky in 1993. The major curriculum integrates the study of a world language and its culture with economics to produce not only professionals who are capable of working in the language in business contexts, but who have the cultural competence to thrive in these environments. Globalization takes many forms and requires cultural and organizational changes at every level of society. Such change is evident in the United States as well as in most nations of the world. The most prominent motivator of this change is the business world. Over the last decade, and since FLIE was incorporated into International Studies in 2006, China and the Arab States have emerged or solidified their positions as major players in the global economy. As part of the reclamation of the FLIE major by Economics, Modern and Classical Languages, Literatures and Cultures and Hispanic Studies in 2012-2013, the FLIE Coordinating Committee reassessed the course offerings and major requirements for all five existing tracks (French, German, Japanese, Russian and Spanish). We also came to recognize that there was a significant gap in the major, namely the absences of FLIE/Arabic and FLIE/Chinese. Course offerings related to these languages have grown significantly at UK over the last 8 years, and we now have the staffing to offer comprehensive FLIE tracks in these languages (Islamic Studies is a minor and there are two full-time faculty in MCL; Chinese is now a major and there are

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four full-time faculty in MCL). Given the current economic climate, it is essential that students in the FLIE program have the option to study economics in combination with Arabic or Chinese.
