Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to discuss from a theoretical and practical perspective the most relevant grammatical aspects of contemporary Spanish, such as: sentence structure, most frequently used verbal tenses and aspects, syllable structure, agreement (subject-verb; noun and noun modifiers), etc. This course is aimed to develop in the students interest and skills for research in Spanish grammar through searching and compiling digital linguistic corpora.

Pre-requisite: SPA 310 and other 300 level course.

Course Objectives:

- Review grammatical structures studied and acquired in previous years.
- Identify and analyze specific grammatical structures of authentic contemporary Spanish.
- Use these structures in both oral and written communication.
- Contrast these structures to the equivalent in English in order to facilitate their comprehension and usage in a variety of contexts.
- Develop interest and skills for research in grammar through the search and compilation of data provided in electronic linguistic corpora.

Participation and preparation:

Class participation is of paramount importance to achieve the objectives of this course. Class time will be devoted to the discussion and practice of assigned material. Students should prepare activities ahead of time, read the indicated material, and look up in dictionaries unknown terms or technical terminology pertaining to grammar and usage.

Attendance:

Attendance is mandatory. An excused absence is, as a general rule, one that is accompanied by an official document (obituary, in case of death in the family, hospitalization, university athletic event, etc.) (<http://www.uky.edu/USC/New/SenateRulesMain.htm>). Stamped excuses from the Student Health Services **DO NOT constitute** an excused absence. Instructor must verify any illness with a Health Service Physician. Absences due to the observance of religious holidays must be notified in written the first 3 days of classes. These strict guidelines will be implemented from the very first day of class. *More than three absences (either justified or not) will result in a failing grade in this course.*

Late arrivals are very disruptive for both instructor and students, therefore, **DO NOT ARRIVE LATE.** Every two late arrivals will count as an unexcused absence.

Homework and other activities:

All activities will be due on the dates indicated in the syllabus unless otherwise stated. No late homework or make-up exams. In case of a justified absence, this should be discussed individually with the instructor. Homework and exams should be legible and clean. Daily homework should be properly identified (name of the student, date, page numbers covered).

As students will realize, the answers for most exercises are at the end of the textbook. Students should complete exercises under the column "*Hacer*" (see the syllabus), they will self-correct their answers using a different color pen. The set of self-corrected activities should be handed to the instructor on the date indicated in the syllabus. These type of activities will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

ACTIVITIES

Grammar: This course builds upon grammatical structures acquired in previous courses and provides greater depth in their analysis. It will also emphasize grammar structures in Spanish that are of specific interest and difficulty for the English-speaking student.

Exams: There will be four exams, one after each major chapter. Dates are indicated in the syllabus. Since the evaluation will be cumulative, there is not final exam.

Grammatical Corpora in Spanish: In order to promote an interest in researching topics in Spanish grammar, students will contrast traditional grammatical formulations as they are expressed in textbooks of all sorts with the daily usage of the language as they appear in newspapers or as they are collected in digital linguistic corpora. Students will consult, compile, organize, and analyze representative corpora of the topics discussed in the course. Detailed information about the requirements and structure for the corpora will be posted on Blackboard.

Vocabulary: Students should enrich their vocabulary through the readings and activities. They need to become familiar with and use accordingly the technical vocabulary associated with grammar and linguistic inquiry.

Conversation: This course will be conducted entirely in Spanish.
