Course Description

This course is designed to assist undergraduates in adjusting to the academic life of the University. Through lectures, discussions, exercises, and out-of-class assignments, UK 101 helps students reach the student learning outcomes listed in this syllabus.

Student Learning Outcomes

As a result of UK 101, students will:

- 1. Identify and pursue avenues and activities to engage with the University of Kentucky community.
- 2. Describe and evaluate their new collegiate learning environment and how to utilize campus resources to aid academic success and personal growth.
- 3. Recognize personal and social issues (e.g., alcohol, health and wellness, financial wellness), articulate healthy behaviors, and identify strategies to address these issues.
- 4. Examine individual backgrounds and experiences and recognize the value of engaging in a diverse community.

Course Requirements

- 1. Class participation is critical to the success of students, and it adds to the success of the course. Participation includes attending and being prepared for class, involving yourself in class discussions and activities, assuming responsibility for your own learning, contributing to the learning of others, and participating in online discussions via Canvas.
- 2. Classroom decorum is important to a conducive learning environment. Being respectful of your classmates and instructors includes engaging in civil discourse, especially when we discuss topics that have a diversity of perspectives; silencing your cell phone; not texting; and other behaviors outlined in class.
- 3. Complete and submit assignments as directed (via Canvas, email, or hard copy—whichever instructor chooses) by designated dates and times.

Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend **ALL** class sessions unless their absence is excused. Attending class is an important part of succeeding in any course, especially a discussion-based course like UK 101. Students will have their final grade deducted by 5% for each unexcused absence. Please see the below for what constitutes an excused absence.

Excused Absences and Verification (University Senate Rule 5.2.4.2)

Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible. Senate Rule 5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences: (a) significant illness, (b) death of a family member, (c) trips for members of student organizations sponsored by an educational unit, trips for University classes, and trips for participation in intercollegiate athletic events, (d) major religious holidays, and (e) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the instructor.

Students anticipating an absence for a major religious holiday are responsible for notifying the instructor in writing of anticipated absences due to their observance of such holidays no later than the last day in the semester to add a class. Two weeks prior to the absence is reasonable, but should not be given any later. Information regarding major religious holidays may be obtained through the Ombud (859-257-3737, Excused Absences.

In situations where a student's total EXCUSED absences exceed 1/5 (or 20%) of the required interactions for the course, the student shall have the right to request and receive a "W," or the Instructor of Record may award an "I" for the course if the student declines a "W." (Senate Rules 5.2.4.2.1)

PLEASE NOTE: For the purposes of this class, one-fifth (20% or more) of class = 4 classes.

Per Senate Rule 5.2.4.2, students missing any graded work due to an excused absence are responsible: for informing the Instructor of Record about their excused absence within one week following the period of the excused absence (except where prior notification is required); and for making up the missed work. The instructor must give the student an opportunity to make up the work and/or the exams missed due to an excused absence, and shall do so, if feasible, during the semester in which the absence occurred.

Academic Integrity

Per University policy, students shall not plagiarize, cheat, or falsify or misuse academic records. Students are expected to adhere to University policy on cheating and plagiarism in all courses. The minimum penalty for a first offense is a zero on the assignment on which the offense occurred. If the offense is considered severe or the student has other academic offenses on their record, more serious penalties, up to suspension from the University, may be imposed.

Plagiarism and cheating are serious breaches of academic conduct. In cases where students feel unsure about a question of plagiarism involving their work, they are obliged to consult their instructors on the matter before submission.

When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording, or content from another source without appropriate acknowledgment of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism.

Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work (including, but not limited to a published article, a book, a website, computer code, or a paper from a friend) without clear attribution. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work, which a student submits as their own, whoever that other person may be. Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone.

When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources or outside information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where, and how they have employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content, and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas, which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain.

Please note: Any assignment you turn in may be submitted to an electronic database to check for plagiarism.

Due: 9/25 How's It Going Reflection – Write a one-page, double-spaced reflection about your first few weeks as a UK student... use these questions as prompts for your thoughts. Looking back over the past several weeks, how has your experience at UK fit with your expectations of college? What have been some of the adjustments? What have you changed about your study strategies? (22.5 points)

Due: 10/30 End-of-Semester Reflection or First-Year Issue Paper (Choose one)

End-of-Semester Reflection Option: Write a 3-4 page, double-spaced reflection about your first nine weeks as a UK student. What have you learned from UK 101 and how to do you plan to utilize that knowledge the second half of this semester and the rest of your first year? What are your goals between now and graduation? How will you achieve those goals? (45 points)

Or

First-Year Issue Paper – Write a 3-4 page, double-spaced research paper about a critical issue facing first-year college students, particularly at UK. Feel free to pick a topic that we discussed during UK 101 and utilize library resources to find research to aid in your paper. (45 points) Some ideas below to get you started:

- How do I discover a major/career path?
- Is the "Freshman 15" a real issue?
- How does unconscious bias impact society?
- What are common first-year financial missteps?
